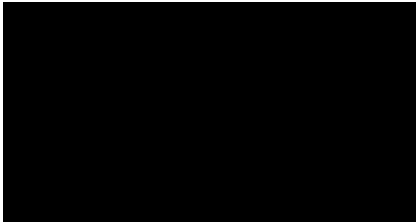


THE BIG THINGS MANITOBA IS DOING TOGETHER

Cutting the gas tax to save Manitobans 14 cents a litre every time they fill up	Since January 2024, Manitobans have paid the lowest gas prices and had the lowest inflation rates in Canada thanks to the gas tax cut, which the government is extending until the end of the year to keep saving money for Manitobans.
